"A lot of people with disabilities will just drop out of college because they kind of see it as this zero-sum game where they can't ever catch up."

"I've noticed, when I did my search in the job market, that if you weren't very good at social skills, you wouldn't get a job. It just didn't happen."



Some students felt it was constructive to disclose their diagnosis to professors.

However, other students described negative reactions to disclosure.

- College life triggered mental health issues, with about 23% of students with autism and 33% of students with ADHD reported having at least one mental health disorder.
- Students expressed concerns about professors not considering their disability.
