A Summer Student Leadership Opportunity



The Autistic Self Advocacy Network (ASAN) hosts a weeklong summer leadership institute for neurodivergent students interested in developing advocacy skills and networking with other campus leaders, **Autism Campus Inclusion**. This is an excellent opportunity for student leaders! According to ASAN, “ACI helps autistic students learn to make their college campuses better for people with disabilities. ACI participants learn about making student groups, understanding disability policy, and talking to people in power. During ACI, all participants go to the U.S. Capitol to talk to their Senators and Representatives about policies important to the disability community. After the Academy, students get help from ASAN to meet their advocacy goals at their college.” ASAN covers the travel and accommodations costs for a week in Washington DC. Please encourage any emerging or current student leaders you work with to submit an application. **The deadline is Sunday, March 6.**
